Making it Happen:

Our Leadership Development International work reaches into Asia-Pacific through our participation in the **Overseas Council Network**. Because of the generosity of New Zealanders, we've:

Provided full study scholarships for 38 students from Myanmar, India, Pakistan and Palestine. Without sponsorship, these young emerging leaders from deeply impoverished backgrounds would not be able to access this accredited tertiary training. Formal biblical education enables them to step up with confidence and capacity to be the leaders God has called them to be in their communities, cultures and countries.

Provided full doctoral scholarships for 9 faculty members from Indonesia, Thailand, Papua New Guinea and Myanmar. These strategically placed senior Christian leaders are doing work (or have completed it) which has, and in the future will have, a huge multiplier effect for the Christian faith within their countries.

Invested over \$98,000 in the development and upgrade of facilities and campuses, ensuring these are safe and healthy sites of learning for trainee leaders in cultures and contexts with few resources for Christians. Most of this money has been put towards Kalaymyo Consortium of Bible Colleges (KCBC) and Myanmar Evangelical Graduate School of Theology (MEGST), both in Myanmar.

Gifted over \$39,000 to the equipping of libraries across seven Partner Schools in Thailand, Vietnam, Mongolia, Myanmar, Sri Lanka and Palestine, ensuring trainee leaders have up-to-date and culturally relevant resources to study well, learning how to follow Christ, and then go on to lead others.

Supported our Partner School MEGST to undertake an Impact Review of 137 graduates from the last 20 years of operation. An outstanding finding is virtually all the interviewees are involved or lead in active ministries addressing a wide variety of spiritual, physical and social needs within the contexts of churches, local communities and Myanmar society.

The work of Langham Partnership NZ in Asia-Pacific is through our participation in **Langham Partnership International** and has excellent outputs. Because of Kiwi generosity we've been able to:

Contribute over \$215,000 to the work of Langham Preaching which held 76 training events in Asia and Pacific, equipping 3,800+ pastors and lay leaders in 13 countries in need of solid biblical teaching. 45+ preaching groups of 10 to 12 pastors and leaders met regularly for ongoing training and mentoring.

Significantly support the doctoral scholarships for Langham Scholars Anna Sui Hluan, Aung Htoo, and George Mombi. These strategically placed senior Christian leaders hold influential positions in their respective fields in Myanmar and Papua New Guinea, and have a huge multiplier effect for the Christian faith.

Distribute over 300 South Asia Bible Commentaries (SABC) and Africa Bible Commentaries (ABC) to church leaders across the region through Langham Literature. The region is so scarce of biblical resources each commentary is used by between 10 to 12 church leaders, who on average each lead a congregation of at least 50 people.

A leadership development approach to mission is the most strategic, long term, and sustainable contribution western Christians and churches can make in reaching, teaching and discipling the world's unreached billions.

An essential part of our work in New Zealand is Mission Education and Advocacy, so we've travelled throughout Aotearoa encouraging Kiwi Christians to get involved in the Kiwi network of support for Christian leaders in Asia-Pacific. This is an inter-country church partnership between brothers and sisters, and we thank you for your ongoing prayers, support and participation in the lives of our partners.

We hosted eight events with this in mind, and were delighted to bring several key international partners to New Zealand to speak about what God is doing in their regions: Dr Riad Kassis from the Middle East, Dr Aung Mang from Myanmar, * Esther and *Trelise from Lebanon and Dr Chris Wright from Langham Partnership International (UK). Bringing the exciting things God is doing in these countries or regions right to our doorstep means we receive a much clearer idea of how we can support our brothers and sisters as they stand for Christ.

Our disaster relief focus is the Syrian refugee crisis. Coming to us via Langham Partnership International, our partner on site is *Esther, who visited New Zealand in July.

Esther runs an accredited Lebanese not for profit, and leads a mostly volunteer team of courageous Christians. Working in high intensity situations on the border between Syria and Lebanon, they have a range of programmes which in the name of Jesus heal the physical, emotional, spiritual and economic wounds of displaced Syrian families

We've focussed mostly on the healing and empowering of young women as one of the most marginalised groups, and also those with the most influence over young children. You gave over \$31,000 towards the running of trauma camps for young women, providing them with emergency supplies to care for their babies, and the establishment and equipping of two sewing schools for young women, widows and mums.

Most of the money was used for the sewing schools, where young women (many of whom previously had little or no schooling) gain much needed economic and small business skills, emotional and social support and healing, and a sewing machine on graduation as the basic equipment to move forward. Located within fully kitted out container conversions, and with highly skilled trainers including a renowned Syrian fashion designer heading up the work, the schools are appropriately named *She is Safe* and *Harmony*.
